

### Peter Orlando Hutchinson





Peter Orlando Hutchinson was a Victorian man of independent wealth who had a deep interest in his surroundings, particularly ancient monuments and the landscape in which they were found. He was born in Winchester in 1810 and by 1846, after travelling extensively around England, he moved with his mother into 4 Coburg Terrace with its view across to the Parish church.

Whilst living in Sidmouth he kept extensive diaries which give us a detailed picture of daily life in Victorian England. From these we learnt that after he objected to the rebuilding of the church in 1858 he bought part of the old building for £45 and together with other pieces of unwanted historic buildings had a new house built near Coburg Terrace which he named the Old Chancel. This building can still be seen today by the rugby club.




Up until his death in 1897 he spent a significant amount of his time recording the landscape in and around Sidmouth with numerous sketches and paintings. Our project is going to compare two of these with the landscape of today. His original paintings are currently held in the Devon Record Office






#### Location 2 - How has High Peak changed?
